15.5 The Employer shall make payment for annual membership in Life Flight Network on behalf of each employee in the amount of fifty-nine dollars (\$59.00).


### **ARTICLE 21 – WAGES**

Dear Tonasket City Council,

My Name is Teresa Davis and I am the Activities Director for North Valley Extended Care. I am writing you today to propose my new project for the residents at Extended Care. I am constantly looking for new ideas and motivation for our residents to keep them happy, healthy and involved. After our COVID pandemic and the restrictions I have learned that our facility needs more in house activities to keep our residents entertained and active. I have added several new creative programs that actively engage our residents indoors and as the weather improves, I need to focus on outdoor planning.

I have done research on pet therapy and the positive effects that it has on elderly residents with dementia or other psychiatric illnesses. Having animals significantly improves the health and wellbeing or elderly people, plus it gives purpose in helping care for them. During my research I stumbled across a program from the UK called HENPOWER and the slogan is henergising older peoples lives. To my surprise chickens and rabbits are very therapeutic pets. So, I've made a few calls and the hospital foundation will fund this new program of having 2-3 chickens and 2 rabbits. We will order the proper mobile pens and create a care plan for the animal's daily needs and health. I spoke with Curt on not being in a residential area and having these animals, he advised me to contact city council to get permission for the project in the facility courtyard. The court yard is enclosed and I will take extra measures to make sure the animals are safe and secure. The addition of these animals will draw people outdoors plus it will work well with our gardening therapies. The animals will be adopted out for the winter months and the program will start again in the spring. It is my intension to get babies and raise them so I have a small window of time to get the project launched and running.

I hope that you will consider giving us the approval for these animals and I have attached a few articles for further education on the benefits of adding these animals for the extended care residents.
